The Lycée Français La Pérouse is the French immersion College Preparatory school in the San Francisco Bay Area, accepting students from PreK1 to 12th grade. Our program is designed to provide students with a structured, well-assimilated body of general knowledge while encouraging the development of analytical and critical thinking skills. Our unique curriculum fosters autonomy, initiative, self-esteem and the respect of others through cooperation and responsibility.

The Lycée is accredited by the French Government, as well as by the California Association of Independent Schools and the Western Association of Schools and Colleges. Students graduate with two diplomas: the French Baccalaureate and the U.S. Highschool diploma. The Lycée is a full immersion school, where all subjects are taught in French, with the exception of English and U.S. History.

The mission of the school

The Lycée Français La Pérouse offers the children of multiculturally-minded San Francisco Bay Area families a rigorous curriculum focused on French-language immersion and academic excellence. Following the French national system, this PreK1 through 12th grade program exceeds all requirements set by both France and the United States and provides full preparation for both European and North American colleges and universities. The diverse and international nature of our students and faculty fosters a spirit of community and respect that prepares our students to be responsible global citizens.

The curriculum

The French system subdivides its 15 school years into eight cycles; some of these cycles include just one grade and others up to three. Within each cycle, there is a coherent set of learning goals and acquired skills to be achieved. The structure of the school compared to the U.S. system is as follows:

Ranking

Due to the various tracks leading to the BAC and to small class size, students are not ranked.

Grading

In the French system, grading is out of 20. Please refer to the attached grading scale. Honors courses are weighted an additional 1.0 point for GPA calculations. AP courses are not offered, but all students take at least one AP test.

Tracks

In the 11th grade, students choose between three tracks ("séries") (the Lycée offers only those tracks that are college preparatory)

Emphasis is placed on the following areas:

- Track L: humanities: literature, languages, philosophy
- Track ES: social sciences: economics, math, history, languages
- Track S: science: math, physics, chemistry, biology

Each of these tracks leads to a different version of the French Baccalaureate exam (the BAC), taken at the end of 12th grade.

In the last four years of school, Lycée students take the following courses. In the 11th and 12th grades, if there is no indication of track, then all students take the course.

The **BAC** is a comprehensive exam that includes topics that are common to all tracks as well as specific to each. A typical BAC exam includes the following written exams as well as an oral exam in English, German or Spanish, and French.

- Biology (3.5 hours, track S)
- Economics and Social Sciences (4 hours, track ES)
- English (3 hours, all tracks)
- French (4 hours, all tracks)
- German or Spanish (3 hours, track L, 2 hours, track S)
- History and Geography (4 hours, all tracks)
- Literature (2 hours, track L)
- Math (3 hours for track ES, 4 hours for track S)
- Math (1.5 hours in 11th grade for track L)
- Philosophy (4 hours, all tracks)
- Physics and Chemistry (3.5 hours, track S)
- Sciences (1.5 hours in 11th grade for tracks L & ES)

The **OIB** (International Option of the BAC) is an advanced curriculum open to students in all three tracks. In addition to their regular course-load, OIB students take honors courses in History, Geography and English. Students take an additional end-of-year Bac exam to fulfill the OIB certification.

Standardized Tests

The French system trains students to work at a deliberate pace to produce written and articulate answers (even in math and sciences.) Multiple choice exams are not used in the French system. Lycee students routinely surpass expectations set by their scores on standardized tests such as the ERB, SAT Reasoning and Subject tests.
